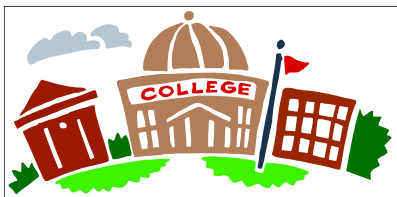

Upon completion of her college studies, Samantha hopes to work for NASA so that she can help to increase our nation's knowledge of outer space.

While at Red Bluff High School she has been a member of the College Scholarship Federation. Samantha has also been actively involved in school athletics including soccer (team captain), basketball, club soccer, and dance.

She has volunteered her time as a U-6 soccer coach, and has been involved with several activities for the College Scholarship Federation including working at concession stands for sporting events and serving food at community feeds. In addition to her volunteer service, Samantha has been employed as a soccer referee for seven years.

The Upper-Division Scholarships are awarded to registered full-time college students who have graduated from a Tehama County high school. These Upper-Division scholarship awards are to be used during the students' junior or senior year of college and the recipients must be majoring in agriculture.



**Corey Carpenter**  
**\$ 2,000**

Corey graduated from Red Bluff High School in 2009. He has lived in Tehama County for 20 years. Corey completed his freshman and sophomore years of college at Modesto Junior College. In the fall he will be

attending California State University, Chico where he will be majoring in Animal Science and minoring in Agriculture Science. Corey plans to earn a PhD in Animal Science with an emphasis on Ruminant Nutrition. Upon graduating from college Corey plans to become an Animal Science Teacher at either a junior college or university.

Corey has been involved in several clubs and organizations during his college years including Modesto Junior College Young Farmers Club (President), National Swine Registry, National Junior Swine Association, California Pork Producers Association (2011 Pork Ambassador), Modesto Junior College Ag Ambassadors, Modesto Junior College Animal Science and Dairy Clubs. He has volunteered his time for a variety of causes from Operation Christmas Child to Walking for Autism.

According to Corey's essay, "The future of Tehama County agriculture lies in the hands of those who can stay diverse in their commodity production, and who can produce them at optimal level." "When you look at people involved in agriculture they have a sincere love and passion for their industry. This aspect makes us unique to the rest of the jobs out there. We as agriculturists can never be too good at educating the public about why we do what we do...It is our distinct responsibility to be an advocate for our industry."

A letter of recommendation that was received on Corey's behalf from John A. Mendes, Animal Science Professor at Modesto Junior College states, "Corey is one of those rare individuals that educators relish the opportunity to interact with not only in the classroom but also in activities outside of the classroom. He has served as a role model for many of his peers through his communication and leadership skills. Corey will be an asset to the agriculture industry."



### Jamie Carter

\$ 2,000

Jamie graduated from Corning High School in 2004. She completed her lower-division college studies at Shasta College. She is currently enrolled in the Post-Bachelor Credential Program at the University of California, Chico. Jamie will be completing her Phase I of teaching agriculture at Red Bluff High School in June. Her ultimate goal is to become an Agriculture Advisor at the secondary education level or higher.

While in college Jamie has belonged to many organizations including Tri-County Young Farmers and Ranchers, Tehama County Jr. Livestock, Shasta College Agricultural Leadership Club, Paskenta Community Hall, Tehama County Cattlewomen, CSU Agricultural Leadership Team, USAC Study Abroad Program (Ireland), and Alpha Tau Alpha. She is also actively involved with community activities and frequently volunteers her time for agricultural events.

In her essay, Jamie states, "It seems that the growth of farmer's markets have steadily been increasing throughout recent years in Tehama County. The uniqueness of farmer's markets is that the produce is most often fresh out of the fields and delivered straight to the consumer without the extra expenditure of using a middleman. It is also a wonderful way to support the local farmers in your community...An issue that arises from the current farmer's market in Tehama County is that it is only seasonal. With all of the positive factors mentioned earlier regarding farmer's markets, why not make the farmer's market in Tehama County year-round?"

According to Jenny Lynn Svejda, Department Head of Agricultural Education at Red Bluff High School, "Jamie's greatest strength is teaching young students. She has the ability and patience to lay down the much needed foundation that young agriculture students need when it comes to agriculture and the FFA."

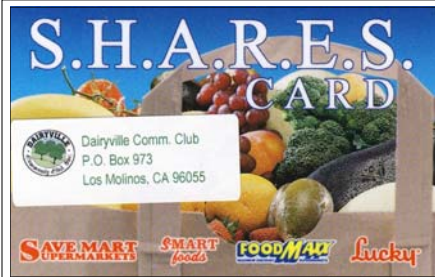
## Team Sunsweet Makes Donation To Scholarship Fund
